The World of VHF

hile VHF DXers sometimes call weak signal work that is not entirely true. Propagation on the VHF/UHF bands is always full of surprises that's what makes it interesting.sometimes very strong signals. To make one thing clear single sideband is far superior to FM for VHF DXing and a lot depends on the antenna when conditions are marginal. The four main propagation modes used in VHF communication are Sporadic E, Tropo Enhancement and ducting, Meteor scatter and Aurora. During the peak of the 11 year solar cycle F2 propagation.

Sporadic E which occurs mainly from May to August is the most common on 6 meters, fairly rare on 2 meters and very rare on 222mh. This also is the propagation that provides short skip openings on 10 and 15 meters in the summer up to 1300 miles. Many times with little activity these openings are detected by propagation beacons that run unattended 24 hours a day, most are low powered CW signals. Several Joplin hams have had beacon stations over the years WOVD, KOETC and WOPW.. The 18 watt KOETC beacon has been heard on 6 meters all over the world, Don WOPW had a beacon on both 2 meters an 1.25 meters.

There are thousands of similar beacons all over the world on 10, 6. 2 and 1.25meters with most running 10 watts or less with simple antennas. Most with an automatic keying system give call letter several limes followed by grid locator, sometimes QTH followed by QSL or report information sometimes an E mail address. It is fun just to log these beacon stations and good code practice also. The closest 6 meter beacon now on the air is on 6 meters on 50.065mh and located in Bartlesville.OK. It signs a series of Vs followed by DE W5GPM EM26. EM26 is the grid locator that Bartlesville is located. It uses a

vertical antenna so actually I hear it as well on my 40 mtr inverted V as my 6 meter 5 element yagi..The signal is usually weak but solid copy 24 hours a day .. Most 6 meter beacons are from 50.050 to 50.070mh and in good band openings you can hear many at one time.

There have already been a few 6 meter E openings reported mostly in southern latitudes but May usually kicks off the skip season. Unlike F skip propagation which follows the sun sporadic E can occur any time day or night, one hop skip maximum is about 1300 miles but double hop openings with weaker signals are possible.

While skip can also be worked on 6 meter FM, most of the activity is on USB between 50.125-50.200mh. Give it a try it is easy, former club member Latty K0AUY worked 30 states with just 10 watts and a vertical when he first got on 6 meters, vertical or horizontal work equally well on skip signals cross polarization doesn't matter only on groundwave or tropo
